




March 2026 Partnership Update

- Live proctoring is no longer required.
- A Spanish-language option is coming soon.

The ACS LION program meets the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services training requirements for principal illness navigation reimbursement and is aligned to Oncology Navigation Standards of Professional Practice.
